## PONDERINGS DEP'T



So, it appears that somebody misunderstood the situation, and spoke to others, but not to Tim. Again, I don't think any of our club members are mean-spirited. But I call on all of us to help maintain the MMM's reputation as the friendliest FF club in America. PLEASE, if you have an issue with something you see a fellow competitor doing, DON'T assume bad motives, and DO approach the person yourself, to clear things up, in a friendly way. In most cases, we'll find it's just a misunderstanding. If not, talk to the CD. Let's not let the MMM be a source of nasty rumors.

This is a great club—the envy of many other clubs. And I'm honored to be serving you. Hey, let's go flying!

## PENSACOLA REPORT DEP'T

Hi guys,

I am just back from my contest trip to Pensacola over the weekend 9/7-8. Here's the short version of this meet report: excellent weather and a lot of fun! More later when I am not so tired.

As stated previously, I just returned from the "Gathering of Turkeys" contest in Pensacola. The meet featured very good weather most of the time, with temps in the low-eighties and sunny skies. Paul Andrade drove up from Orlando. He did lots of flying and also got some great pics. He and I pitted with the Texas FAC Squadron (Mike Midkiff and Mike Isermann).

Paul won Mulvihill with a 360+180. I got second when I dropped the first flyoff max badly.

I got second in Moffett and Paul got third. I was flying a brand new model which shows a lot of promise. I short-Dted my first flight for a 1:58...damn!

I managed to win Small OT stick over a crowded field of about 10. I did a 360 plus two flyoff 180s. On Monday morning my Gollywock did 3:25 for second place in the "Gollywocks Galore" one-flight-at-8:30 AM event. The winner did 3:32.

Dawn Mulvihill was interesting. Neither Paul nor I had "real" dawn models but we decided to give it a try anyway. I just wanted to see what my Altmann Nos Wake would do in still air, and Paul was trying out a new "Big Bird" 300 sq. inch Mulvihill. The third entrant was Jim Bethea with a great-flying OT Korda "C". The three of us launched within 2 minutes of each other as soon as the window opened at 7am. Immediately we could see that the models were drifting much further than anticipated. Paul and I both came down off the field beyond some very tall pine trees to the West. We were not hopeful about getting our models back since the land around this field is generally filled with swamps, dense undergrowth, and 50-100 ft trees. I drove around the north side in my rental car and Paul took his bike around the south side. Meanwhile Jim Bethea's timer lost his model in the air at about

2:30. As I followed my weak radio signal and heard it getting stronger I looked ahead through the forest and saw a clearing, then a house, then...my model on the roof! What incredible luck! I ran into Paul about that time, and he had his model too. He had landed in a front yard just a few houses away from me. When we got back to the launch point the timers reported the times: DeLoach 5:16, Andrade about 4:20, and Bethea ?. Jim found his model the next day in a field just short of the housing development where Paul and I had landed.

P-30 was a horse race between me and Paul Grabski. We were the only two to max out of a field of about 8. We each made a 180 flyoff max then I launched my second flyoff max shooting for 180. I rode under the model on a borrowed bike and timed it to the ground at 3:05, but I knew it had landed below a hill so I doubted I got the max. Sure enough the official time was 2:43. Meanwhile Paul G. picked great air and did the max. Another second place for DeLoach. Paul A. also flew P-30 and finished somewhere near the middle of the pack.

I flew some FAC events too. Second in FAC Peanut and third in WWII mass launch.

MMM member Gene Smith (Stillwater, OK) did the most flying of anybody. I think he won every AMA gas event plus several classic gas and nostalgia. There wasn't a lot of competition in the gas events but Gene flew hard anyway. He also won FAC Golden Age scale with his fantastic Corben Super Ace.

The Pensacola field is very good and the club is first rate, with lots of comraderie among flyers. The Saturday night banquet was outstanding. If you are ever in Pensacola you must go to the Cock of the Walk restaurant, just north of I-10. The best cole slaw and cornbread I've ever had. And the fried chicken was amazing. Yum Yum.... deep south cookin!

## CONTEST REPORT

### **Colorado Springs Indoor Meet 10/15/06**

#### **Don DeLoach, CD**

Nine contestants signed up for this the first of four indoor meets at Colorado Springs Auditorium for the 2006-07 season. Several of us picked up some easy club points because at least half a dozen of our indoor “regulars” were missing due to work travel and other conflicts. Expect the November 19th date (6th Annual Autumn Indoor Champs and National Cup Challenge) to draw a lot more flyers.

Some great times were turned in by several flyers, and three club records fell at this meet. Bill Leppard crushed his own Open Pennyplane record by more than a minute and a half, and upped his A-6 record by 11 seconds. Eric Monda—still very new at indoor flying—had his F1M going great and broke Bill Leppard’s one-flight site record by 24 seconds. Eric also had a new F1D that was looking great. In the glider events Team Reynolds blackened the airspace with good-flying V-tailed ships. Todd got his catapult glider trimmed out and flying well enough for first place, but only after he’d used up all his official flights.

Based on discussions with various flyers today, I think it makes sense to run Open Pennyplane and F1M as a combined event at all our future meets. They are very close in performance and several guys have them.

Also, you can fly a Limited Pennyplane as an Open PP. This means double the flying for owners of LPPs!

The three remaining meets at the Colorado Springs Auditorium are: November 19th, January 28th, and March 25th. All are Sundays and flying will be 9am-5pm each day as usual. The November and March dates will be NFFS Indoor National Cup sanctioned!

Thanks to Bill Leppard, Rick Pangell, Jerry Murphy, Eric Monda, and everyone else who lent a hand at the CD table. When everyone pitches in just a little these meets are a lot easier to run.

## Indoor Freeflight – US NATS and Kibbie

Being retired and an indoor freeflight addict, I took the opportunity to participate in this year's two premier indoor contests- the US Indoor NATS and the Kibbie Dome Indoor Contest. I thoroughly enjoyed both contests and thought that MMM members would be interested in a description of both contests.

**US NATS** - The US Indoor Nationals were held in the Mini Dome at East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, TN. The Mini Dome was constructed to house a football field so has a lot of floor area. The shape of the dome is a semi cylinder with the axis of the cylinder perpendicular to the length of the football field. This means that everyone flies in the center where the ceiling is the highest – approximately 120 feet. There are a myriad of girders which regularly hang up aggressive flyers. Another “plane trap” is a scoreboard which was installed two or three years ago. The support wires for the scoreboard are real plane magnets. Unfortunately, it's virtually impossible to rescue a plane when it gets hung on a wire on inside of the scoreboard. Fortunately, this year there was little or no drift and what drift there was seemed to be away from the scoreboard. Thus, the scoreboard was not decorated with as many planes as it was last year.

Flying – each day is divided into two sessions: a morning session typically from 7:30 am to 1:00 pm and an afternoon session typically from 1:00 pm to 10:00 pm. The morning session of the first day is devoted to gliders and the morning sessions for the next three days are devoted to FAC and AMA scale. The afternoon sessions and the entire last day are devoted to indoor duration models. In each indoor duration session from 3 to 5 different duration classes are flown and the only class to be flown on two days was F1D. For instance, on the first day the duration classes flown were intermediate stick, 35 cm, and the first day of F1D. While having nine hours to fly per session may seem like a lot of time, I find that flying more than two classes in any one session is all I can handle, particularly when the times per flight are twenty to thirty plus minutes.

Results – This year there were 95 registered entrants. I was very fortunate this year to finish in the trophies (actually plaques) in five different events: 1<sup>st</sup> in hand launched stick, 2<sup>nd</sup> in 35 cm, 2<sup>nd</sup> in Open Penny Plane, 3<sup>rd</sup> in Intermediate Stick, 3<sup>rd</sup> in F1L, and 5<sup>th</sup> in Limited Penny Plane. The number of trophies awarded is based on the number of entrants. Usually, trophies are awarded to the first three places, but for events such as Open Penny Plane with a high number of entrants trophies were awarded up to sixth place. Of special note at this year's Indoor NATS is that one of our own, Rob Romash, was the CD and did one heck of a job – Thanks Rob!!!

**KIBBIE** - The Indoor Kibbie Contest was held at the Kibbie Dome at the University of Idaho in Moscow, ID. Like the Tennessee Mini Dome, the Kibbie Dome is an indoor football arena. Like the Tennessee Mini Dome its shape is semi cylindrical, but the axis of the cylinder runs the length of the football field which means that the entire football field is usable for flying. The Kibbie dome is 150 feet high and has no girders; however the ceiling is covered with suspended white tiles. The tiles are arranged in sections with gaps between the sections, so that it is possible to fly through a gap and land on the top of the tiles on an adjacent section. This happened to several planes during this years contest. Fortunately, the maintenance people can open hatches above the suspended tiles and push the stranded planes free (if they can initially locate them). The only flying impediments are two curtains which are reefed and are lifted to a height of about 120 feet. These curtains divide the flying area into thirds. Another impediment in the center section is a scoreboard, however it is sheathed in plastic and does not ensnare models, they just hit it and slide down. This year we flew light duration models (F1D, 35 cm, and Intermediate Stick) at one end while the heavier duration models were flown at the other end. At the same time, the FAC scale guys were flying in the center section.

Flying - One of the big differences with the Kibbie contest is you can fly what you want when you want as there are no time slots for the different classes. The other big difference is the very laid back atmosphere. We flew for five days from 8:00 am until 8:00 pm. The glider folks flew from 8:00 am to 9:30 am and the rubber folks flew the rest of the time.

Results – I believe that the final number of participants was 39, smaller than the turn-out for the NATS, but a good number of very excellent flyers. The winners and times were:

These times were very competitive with those listed above for the NATS. I found that I needed to recalibrate my VP and use more turns/torque at Kibbie to achieve about the same times as I had at the NATS. Don't fully understand why the differences (then again, there are a whole bunch of things about indoor that I don't understand). People have postulated that it's the altitude (2500 ft vs 1500 for the NATS) or the temperature (cooler at both the floor and ceiling levels), and/or the humidity (much lower and comfortable humidity at Kibbie). The people at Kibbie were very congenial and very competent flyers.

All in all, I had a fantastic time at both events. If you are at all interested in indoor, then I would strongly encourage you to attend one or both of these events next year. If you don't feel that you are competitive, don't worry, they are both great places to practice, great places to learn, and great places to have a lot of fun. You can fly your heart out and you're not obligated to post a single official time. The one thing that I've learned about indoor flyers is that they are more than willing to give as much help and advise as you ask for – you just have to ask.

Supporting the Kibbie contest is particularly important as I believe that the CD Andrew Tagliafico either just covered the expenses or fell slightly short. If we indoor flyers don't support important contests such as the Kibbie Contest, then we will loose access to a premier indoor flying site and that will be another step toward the demise of indoor flying.

Remember that we have two MMM indoor contest scheduled for this Fall – get building and see you there!!!

## MYPAL NOCAL DEP'T

Hi everyone,

I want to hold an FAC WWII No-Cal scale mass launch event at all future indoor meets. I know of several clubs who hold this event and it is quite popular.

No cal models are quick and easy to build. Obviously time is short for getting a model ready for Nov 19th, but I have quite a few plans to share. I will go dig them up and let everyone know what I have. In the meantime check out Mike Morrow's offerings at <http://members.aol.com/aalmps/nocal.html>.

The FAC rules for No-Cal are copied below. The difference is this event will be "combat", eg, mass launch, one flight--last one down wins. Another rule: minimum weight without rubber will be 6.2 grams. This is the USIC/AMA Nats standard for No-Cal and is within reach of anyone. There are no prop or rubber restrictions.

To be eligible your model must be an aircraft which a) saw actual combat in WWII or b) have been mass produced and intended for WWII combat. Fighters or bombers are eligible.

A bonus: your WWII model is eligible to fly in regular No-cal at our indoor meets—no judging and a three flight total.

### **Don DeLoach**

Here are the Official FAC Rules:

1. Event intent: Competition for recognizable profile scale models.
2. Scale considerations:
  - A) Motor sticks shall not exceed fuselage length.
  - B) Surfaces may be single covered.
  - C) All wing struts must be on the model.
  - D) Model must be in correct color scheme.
  - E) Model must have control outlines, registration numbers, etc.
1. D) Have proof of scale. Judge's decisions are final.
2. Wing span: 16 inches maximum.
3. Prop diameter: NA.
4. Launch technique: hand.
5. Landing gear: aircraft with fixed landing gear must have each
6. landing gear represented as per the original subject.
7. Official flight:
  - A) 20 second minimum.
  - B) NO MAX!
8. Scoring: total of three flights.
9. Bonus points: NA.
10. Tie breaking: fly off

**(Note to prospective No-Cal builders:** I actually went to the website and downloaded a plan and got it copied to the correct size at Kinko's. You can take ANY 3 view of a WW-2 model and do the same. Total time and cost: 1-1/2 hours and 85 cents, plus gas. I had enough scrap lumber and tissue so there was no cost for that and I have a computer to use the ink-jet on tissue graphics. If you have a color 3 view it's easy, but you still have to mess with the print on tissue deal at Kinko's. I suppose I could have done the graphics at Kinko's too for about 2 bucks. It took me a total of 3-1/2 hours to build and assemble the model per the plans. *Read on to the next page for other tricks* - Rick)

**Creating Insignia and Markings**  
by Frank W. Beatty

Colorful appropriate markings, insignia, and lettering can bring our models to life. Suitable markings may be furnished in the kits we buy or can be purchased at hobby shops. Scratch builders can generate suitable markings on home computers or at copy centers such as Kinko's, but sometimes none of these options will do the job.

This describes an additional system of creating markings that has worked on half dozen or so of my models.

Obtain a piece of plate glass 12 x 12 or 12 x 18 inches with the edges ground round to prevent cuts. Coat one side with a sudsy, soapy film of water. (I use a bar of Oil of Olay hand soap.) When dry, spray with coats of dope. It can be clear or colored coats depending upon how you will go about creating the images.

The clear, doped glass can be placed directly over a full-size pattern of the image you are duplicating. Designs such as an Indian Head Squadron insignia or unusual lettering can be painted or inscribed directly above the pattern below using model dopes or FW Acrylic Artist ink. These inks can tolerate some handling and will not be affected by the protective clear dope overspray that will follow.

If there are large, unusual-style letters or numbers, then, spray the glass with that color. Trace the outlines on the plate and then cut around the outline with an X-Acto knife. The soapy film will act as a release agent and these images will easily lift off the glass.

Trace around where the image will be located on the model and paint that area with a very watery, thinned-out mix of Elmer's Glue and then apply the image to that area. Squeegee out any surplus glue and level out any bubbles. This application of glue sets the image to the model surface and will prevent crazing or distortions from occurring when a protective, clear dope overspray is applied to the area.

The colored dopes can be sliced into very thin strips and used for pin striping around lettering, etc. These thin strips and images we have created are surprisingly strong and will tolerate considerable handling without breaking up.

What do you use to form your props? Do you use the cylinder method or do you carve your own forms?


Answer:

Regarding prop forms, I make a pitch blocks and a camber form for each of my props. I know people who swear by this technique and people who swear by the cylinder technique. My reasoning is that a pitch block and a camber form give you a true helical pitch prop (for whatever benefit that gives). Also, for a lot of my props with balsa blades (F1L, EZB, F1M, Open Penny Plane) I glue the prop spar to the blade before forming, then I cut a groove in the camber form for the prop spar and form the blade/spar combination. I also use a tissue-tube socket at the prop shaft. This allows me to set whatever pitch I want and to replace only one blade/spar if I break one. If you want, I'll bring a pitch block and camber form to the MMM dinner tomorrow night.

The A-6 that I use is a slightly modified "Wart" by Gary Hodson (the guru of A-6's). The plan appears in INAV #108. I don't use his tiplets and use an underslung rudder.

The F1L that I use is the one by Richards in INAV #96. I built it back when I first got started in indoor and have been flying it ever since. (Plan Follows)
