


PONDERINGS DEP'T

Motorcycle Use on the Field Policy:

- Follow the roads wherever possible and not to follow the planes cross-country. If the plane lands within walking distance of the road, park the bike and retrieve the plane on foot. If not, take the shortest path possible to the plane in order to retrieve it.
- Avoid riding through noxious weeds.

STUFF DEP'T

Individual Spray Unit:

Spraying a model with some fuel proof finish usually means you want to use epoxy paint. I have used Ace Hardware white appliance paint with great success on gas models, but what if you want yellow? You can go buy some jar paint and maybe use a sprayer, but they are a pain to use for small amounts.

While I was looking for a yellow epoxy spray at Ace hardware, I came across this nifty item called the Preval Spray system. It has a jar and a pressurized canister attached to the top of it for \$6.99. Put what you want to spray in the jar, mixed like you want and spray. Also, if you want to use another finish, like Helmsamn outdoor urethane, which is fuel proof, you can buy a can of it and not spend the price of a spray can. Also available at Harbor Freight.

The canisters are replaceable for about \$5 so I bought two more whole units. That way I get two more jars too. Look into it: Their web site is: www.prevalspraygun.com/home.htm

PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS By Pete McQuade



"Free Flight is not dead! I got the answer loud and clear. When Ocie Randall asked the crowd if it was, three hundred voices shattered the desert land with a resounding "NO" which clogged my ear for a week. Every crawling lizard on the vast prairie-land at Taft now knows that Free Flight is here forever!"

That prophetic observation by Don McGovern appeared in "Flying Models" magazine's September 1971 coverage of the US Free Flight Championships. It was of course, prompted by a pervasive feeling, that with R/C's increasing popularity, FF was a dying dinosaur. I'm sure Don would have smiled if he could have glimpsed the Free Flight world of 2010.

Oh, the changes he'd have seen. The indomitable Taft is no longer the Mecca of Free Flight, and the Nats is always held in just one place -- Muncie, Indiana. The Tee Dee .049 is no longer the gold standard of 1/2A engines, and Pirelli rubber is just a memory. Carbon fiber and exotic covering materials Don probably never dreamed of are de rigeur today. Discus-launched gliders have wrought a revolution and a renaissance in handlaunched gliders, both indoors and out. Electronic timers, and Silly-Putty timers, and bunters and delayed-pitch props and composite D-box structures, and four-minute-plus early-morning maxes, now all commonplace, would surely be alien to Don's eyes. And a host of Free Flight's greatest personalities are no longer with us, sadly including Don himself.

On the other hand, he'd see some familiar things, too. The sport is still vibrant and has a dedicated following, with enough young people to guarantee its future. "Flying Models" is still around and giving Free Flight excellent coverage. Although

Taft has relinquished its place of honor, that role has migrated only a few miles to Lost Hills. Thermals can still be tricky, downdrafts too often get the better of us, and a max-out is still something to be proud of. Some of the very same chase bikes that putt-putted around Taft and kicked up dust on Don's models are still chasing models today. And Fast Richard is, once again, a colorful force majeur in this sport. But most of all, I wish he could see what's become of the MMM. It's always been a first class club, but its metamorphosis in the recent past has been astonishing. Our club has become an important and much-respected center of free flight activity in this country. The enthusiasm, dedication, and creativity of our members, the lifeblood of the MMM, is well-known and thriving. Our fliers, volunteers, organizers, and CDs continue to keep the sport going strong. On a national level, our own Don DeLoach is now the editor of the NFFS Digest. In just a few months, he has already done amazing things in that capacity. Jerry Murphy, a recent Outdoor Nats CD, is chairman of the AMA's Free Flight Contest Board. Chuck Etherington is co-chairman of the FAI Outdoor Team Selection Committee. Rob Romash is chairman of the NFFS's Indoor Subcommittee, and a past Indoor Nats CD and frequent Assistant CD. And our MaxOut editor, Rick Pangell, was editor of the prestigious 2008 NFFS Symposium.

On the local scene, at least for now, we have access to not just one, but TWO great fields. Randy Reynolds's Scramble format has reenergized our monthly contests so they're now more excitingly competitive. Our major outdoor and indoor contests continue to draw top-level competitors from around the US, and our members travel to major contests around the country and do exceptionally well there. And at the recent club Annual Meeting, we voted to host WESTFAC III in 2011, an important step for us. So, if anybody wonders if Free Flight in the US is anything but healthy and flourishing, they just have to look at the MMM.

Yes, I wish Don McGovern could have glimpsed all these things back in September, 1971. But then, from the tone of his quote above, I have to wonder if maybe he did.

Don, DeLoach---Yes I lost my two best power models OOS in a span of two months in 2007. Been doing a lot of rubber since then but 2010 is my comeback year.

As for Deliverance Dan's [Berry] snarky jab about my future crashes, I did have one spectacular crash with my Seelig-tube equipped ABC bunter back in 2005 that proved the ruggedness of said tube. Chuck was there and can vouch that it was at least a 9.5 out of 10 (*Chuck's comment: I gave it a perfect 10*).

I launched the model on a full run and it bunted perfectly, but the engine never shut off. It then kicked into glide and proceeded to do a beautiful loop at 80 MPH, ascending to, what would you say Chuck, 1000 feet, then screaming down to earth and (mercifully) completing the loop at about 10 feet AGL, at which time it (mercifuilly) ran out of fuel (Chuck's comment: Don's use of the glide setting to maintain positive wing loading was inspired. It provided the lateral stability needed to make a really large inside loop and show off the model's grace).

At some point near level flight the wings departed the aircraft (but did not fold—great builder!) and the fuselage continued forward ballistically spearing us on the flightline as it skipped smartly across the hill top (Chuck's comment: The timing of the body release from the wing left the judges on the edge of their seats).

Was the plane dead? Far from it Danny boy. The stab and wing were both undamaged. The Seelig tube body was cracked in several places near the pylon but was easily fixed with epoxy and glass cloth. The model was back in the air the following weekend and went on to compete at the '05 Nats (where on its first official it glided into the white farmhouse to the southeast and broke again).

Now tell me, Dan, do you feel THIS lucky??

Chuck's comment: As Don was walking back with the wreckage looking angry, I looked at Murph and he had that, "What can I do to be helpful," look in his eyes. I whispered to him, "Don't say a thing." He agreed.

MMM'rs DO GOOD DEP'T

Hi guys, and thanks for coming to the Southwest Regionals.

The P-30 event was well received and with the top 3 finishers separated by only 8 seconds after 5 flights, it was all we hoped for.

Third place was a guy new to the event. P-30 is one of those rare events that puts seasoned veterans and rookies on nearly even footing.

A Special Event at the 2010 Nationals in Muncie will take place for models meeting the recently submitted rules proposal criteria:

- Maximum Wing Area: 200 Sq. In.
- Maximum Rubber: 20 grams
- No auto surfaces (lock down only)
- Maximum Times: 2 min., 3 min., 4 min. All fly off flights are 4 minutes.
- All other rules as they pertain to the Mulvihill class apply.
