Gary Oakins presiding...PREZ dipping his toes into Lake Superior? Gary Oakins presiding. Rick Arland coming to August contest. Andy and Larson Ringlien in addition to Bill Kuhl to attend the NATS. Had a discussion about RC-DT. AMA rules and NFFS allows it, differing opinions about what it meant. Editor thinks that flight time should be terminated as soon as DT activated because no longer free flight! Others disagreed for some reason! Meeting probably poorly attended because of July 4 holiday?

Hugh Langevin caught his last thermal (fish) on May 20, 2019! He had just turned 90 the month prior.

Hugh joined the MMAC in the 1945 time period and won some events back then at an early age. After his tour of duty in Korea, he returned to the club about 1958, and was the newsletter editor for a few years in the early 1960s. During the 1960s, he developed the Osprey Nordic A-2 design, and won his first try at the FAI World Championships in that event. He went on to qualify for the team on 4 more occasions, and finishing 5th at one of the WC, and his models shown in German magazines claiming the finest design and construction seen at the contest.

Hugh's fine construction of strong, durable, high performance A-2s was a testament to his fine craftsmanship using lathe and machined parts along with his sleek design. The Osprey seen in this picture was later copied by Bob Isaacson in California and renamed the Buntbone, with very similar profile, and remains competitive even today.

After 1976 with a disastrous US Team Trials in Hastings, and a divorce, Hugh stopped building and put all of his energy into fly fishing and wood working. When his daughter out grew her small home, he traded homes with her downsizing and having to redo his woodworking shop. He had it all finished, but lost his health, and ended up selling all of his equipment prior to moving to an apartment. Clyde White was a dedicated helper in Hugh's FAI competition events as

seen in this picture.



At Wichita Kansas in 1964, Hugh won his first chance at the USA A-2 team. Windy weather found Hugh inching up the leader board and topped it on the last flight.

This picture taken in the 1970s in Taft California with a Central flyoff found Hugh qualifying for the 1972 team.

On the fishing end of his life, he tied famous bass fishing flies, and huge Northern Pike flies, and at one time held the record of a 50 lb northern by fly fishing gear, usually up on the Canadian border. Also spent much time on the Missippi bass fishing either in Monticello or down towards Winona.

Hugh was always the gentleman and nurtured many young persons in modeling and fishing technique including the editor and Rick Pangell. Rick remembers many sessions hanging out in Hugh's or my basement watching us build and asking just a few questions!

Ray Lagermeier was the only other MMAC member to make the FAI team, that in 1954. Sid Jepson, Bernie Gaffron, and the editor were alternates, but nothing opened.

Picnic Contest, June 9, 2019, Don Monson, CD (editor reporting)

Forecast was not the best, and the weatherman delivered! Flew first event before 9 am, and near max chases were only about 300 yards. After that the wind was brisk with periods of not so brisk. Matt Decker brought out a new P-30 that looked promising after a few flights, but the wing folded on the winding stooge from a wind gust. 2019 NATS: by Andy Ringlien

Larson and I had a great time at the Nats, once we got there. Had a bit of trailer tire trouble on the way down, and even when fixed we still couldn't seem to go much faster than 55 mph and keep it in our lane! Then in the wee hours Sunday night at the field, we parked and unhooked in a stall only to discover that its electricity wasn't working! They got it fixed by noon the next day.

Nats participation numbers continue to drop, but those that remain are making sure it is a great contest.

Hung out with Bill Kuhl during his running of the E-20 event Monday night and helped "time". Those are some cute models that really fly, and 10-12 people flew in the evening event after a tough windy day of "regular" flying.

We spent the majority of our time in the glider pen, competing in OT HLG, OT CLG, CLG, and HLG. Andy won OT HLG, Larson won each day's senior event with times that placed well in Open. Not much luck in F1A (as expected) with our straight-tow Ultimate Dragmasters, as they repositioned the flight line such that we couldn't tow upwind more than 100 feet... and it was pretty calm.

Didn't fly my usual Mulvi, Moffett, Embryo, Jimmie Allen or F1G events for one reason or another.

Did get the rubber twisted Friday for P-30 and OT Stick, where I stuck my P-30 in the corn on the 3 minute flight, and chose not to waste flying time searching. So, without back up model I stopped flying with 690, which was good for 4th. My rocket-like Gollywock took 3rd in OT stick. I somehow DT'd a 2 min flight 30 seconds early from maybe 300 feet and watched it descend and touch at 1:57. Late in the week of a 5 day contest such mistakes are all to common.

Late Friday we towed a bit in Classic, I went 2 min, 3 min, flop. Larson took a high spot by going flop, 3 min, 4 min. Both of our Dragmaster's flying beautifully as long as we have room to run until we find lift!

Larson's week-long results netted him the Senior over all points National championships over Bob Stalick's grand kid, Roman.

Side notes: We were called by two homeowners to the South East who had found two of our fly-a-ways. Got corn-bound P-30 back after contest Friday night as I stood on top of Yukon directing Larson (carrying a tall pole) through the corn near the airport runway. As the Muncie astronomer club was setting up next to me to gaze at Saturn and Jupiter... they let us have a peek through their awesome equipment. Now that is a hobby I do not understand, though it is maybe "saner" than ours.

Am interested to try Hi-start glider (provisional status event at Nats this year), using 25 grams of rubber (1/8" seems to be the most preferred for A-1 sized planes) and 100 feet of string. Would that be popular with our members who don't love to run anymore?

Was home by midnight Saturday, itching to head up to join you guys Sunday as weather looked good. But after leaving Ashley and Hannah home by themselves for 8 days, it was best to spend some time at home.
